

Polio survivors call for fair go

MARGARET Maroney's earliest memories of her childhood battle with polio are of being left lonely and afraid in a big cold place as she waved goodbye to her parents.

The farming family had been forced to send their three-year-old daughter to a children's home in Sydney while she recovered from the debilitating viral disease that can affect nerves and lead to partial or full paralysis.

The 61-year-old Holt resident remembers spending about 12 months there, before returning to her home in Young, NSW.

"From there I was taken home wearing boots and callipers on my left leg," she said.

Ms Maroney underwent two surgeries at the age of five and 10 neither of which completely corrected the mobility issues with her left leg. 'My foot has had ongoing pain but I just got used to it - because the

bones are not set properly," she said. As a result of her illness Ms Maroney fatigues easily, has poor circulation in her left leg and is

susceptible to infection in the limb. Despite her troubles she considers herself to be "one of the lucky ones"

She went on to marry, have six children and has spent the past 15 years working as a nurse.

'There's so many of us out there "My father used to massage my leg every night ... with this horrible syndrome that's put them back into

Tomorrow Ms Maroney will join more than 50 campaigners at Parliament House to talk to politicians about the need for government funding to boost services for polio survivors.

President of Polio Australia Gillian Thomas said the government needed to stop relying on volunteers to do all the work. "It is way past time that polio survivors received funding for bestpractice services, including those that Polio Australia delivers," she said.

'Polio survivors don't complain We have quietly carried on with our lives. "But now, more than ever, we need support and it's time to give us a fair go by funding the health and support services we need. We're not asking for a handout, just a fair go.'

Yes, We're Still Here!

Tens of thousands of Australians contracted paralytic polio between the 1930s and 1960s and as they head into their senior years, the development of new symptoms can occur, commonly known as the 'Late Effects of Polio'.

Symptoms include . . .

~ unaccustomed fatigue unrelated to activity decreased strength and endurance

- ~ pain in muscles and/or joints
- weakness and muscle atrophy
- muscle spasms/twitching
- ~ respiratory and sleep problems
- ~ swallowing or speaking difficulties

Survivors lobby MPs

FRANKSTON-based MP Bruce Billson was among politicians lobbied by a 60-strong delegation of polio survivors in Canberra to raise awareness of their "We're Still Here!" campaign. Mr Billson spoke with Fran Henke, of Hastings, a committee member of Mornington Peninsula Post Polio Support Group and chair of Polio Reference Group Victoria.

The polio survivors converged on Parliament House on 31 October,

coinciding with the launch of a new online resource module by Ballarat MP Catherine King.

The module, The Late Effects of Polio: Introduction to Clinical Practice. provides health professionals with the latest information on the treatment of patients with late effects of polio, or post-polio syndrome.


